## Oversight Tools:

- **Letters & Briefings** – Early, informal fact-finding
- **Hearings** – Public or private questioning of witnesses
- **Reports** – Summarizing findings and recommendations
- **Audits** – Financial or performance reviews
- **Investigations** – Targeted, time-bound fact-finding

## Compulsory Powers:

- Subpoenas for documents or testimony
- Depositions (sworn questioning outside hearings)
- Formal document requests

## Key Partners:

- **Inside Government:** Inspectors General (IGs), Government Accountability Office (GAO), agency liaisons
- **Outside Government:** Whistleblowers, press/reporters, transparency organizations (POGO, CREW), advocacy groups

## Process:

1. **Plan the Investigation:** Set objectives, identify leads, define scope
2. **Gather Information:** Requests, interviews, site visits, IG/GAO reports
3. **Analyze & Build Record:** Organize evidence into a coherent narrative
4. **Use Findings:** Legislation, appropriations changes, referrals for action

## Political & Strategic Dynamics:

- Majority vs. minority powers and resources
- Partisan vs. bipartisan inquiries
- Managing leaks, narrative control, and public engagement

## Best Practices:

- Be specific and clear in requests
- Protect sources and sensitive data
- Coordinate with allies inside and outside government
- Avoid overbroad requests slowing progress
- Avoid Excessive partisanship reducing credibility
- Follow up on findings
